

East Bridgford Drama Group A MONTH OF SUNDAYS by Bob Larby

I have been given the honour of writing a revue on EBDGs latest offering in our Village Hall. May I say that this is an easy task because the production was truly excellent and the characters were all so strong. "Bravo" to the director, **KATE THORNBURROW**, whose gladly-given time and doubtless hard work on this particular production was so deservedly rewarded with warm applause and appreciative laughter in, mostly, all the right places!

The action of the play takes place in a Rest Room for the Elderly. One wondered, as the curtain opened, what direction the play would take with such a sensitive subject – the ailing elderly in their twilight years – but this play was tenderly and perceptively written. It revolved around the two central characters Cooper (ALAN HAYDOCK) and Aylott (LEN JACKSON). These two were excellent and soon had us all experiencing the rapport between them – brilliant timing on Cooper's part meant we never missed one single laugh or one poignant moment. Such lines as: "I've had a fall, I now have to get up twice in the night instead of once, and 'remarkably fit for his age George Hartley' has joined the Zombies!" or "I think he's taking mental measurements for when I have to be fitted with the dreaded bags. I read it up. You get no warning, apparently. I mean, you don't feel that you want to pee. You just do. Not very much. You're sitting there and the first you know of it is a warm trickle – and incontinence is your new companion" couldn't fail to receive an audible audience response, often gales of laughter. (We know we may all be there one day!).

Helping us to see the humour of growing old were other fine performances: **ELLA ROSS** (the caring Nurse Wilson who never appeared in those stockings!). **MOLLY WOOD** (virtually type-cast as the formidible cleaning lady - Mrs Baker – and doesn't she do it well?). **JEAN STARBUCK** (a superb beligerent daughter who only wanted her father to 'love' her), and last but not least, **MICHAEL CLARKE** (her dominated husband, Peter, who knew the M1 like the back of his hand and made it interesting!).

And please remember - if you can't name the 11th man in the 1947 Middlesex Cricket Team, you're still okay for a bit longer!!

Well done everybody – backstage crew and Front of House too - it was a superb evening's entertainment and we hope the next one will be <u>as</u> professional.
