

Copy of Adjudication.

Dangerous Corner - J.B. Priestley.

Adjudicator: Joyce Bromley.

Dates: 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th & 5th March 1994.

Acting:

- Freda Caplan. Very good vocal modulation within an expressive voice. Good variety in your rate of speech, one knew you had learned sense and not just lines. As your temper varied your voice expressed it.
- Miss Mockridge. Nice sparky performance, good enjoyment of gossip. You listened with great interest to the talk resulting from the recognised cigarette box. Stylish exit.
- Betty. Good young manner, wilful and sweet in turn. Well portrayed impulsiveness and vulnerability. Your outburst on not being a child had strength.
- Olwen Peel. Very expressive face and eyes. Olwen's intelligence and quiet authority very nicely played. 'Robert, did you take that money?' Tenseness excellent. Good emotional control which continues through your movement. Lovely and withering in 'wise little Betty'. Lovely vocal quality.
- Charles Stanton. Good voice and stage presence and excellent movement. Emotional control telling which projected the maturity required.
- Gorden Whitehouse. Always quick to rise to the defence of Martin when criticised. Good nervous sensitivity. Graceful in your movement which was necessary to your character and your love of dancing. Softly spoken clear speech.
- Robert Caplan. Played the host very well, always trying to promote reason. Very good voice and control of temper which gave glimpse of the mastery within that Martin feared. Your own self awareness and your breakdown leading to 'Because I am a fool' was most touching.

Production:

Good opening dialogue, Freda crossing to d.r. attending to the wall lights and radio got over the difficulty of single file entrance, which was all this platform stage allowed for, and opening the picture nicely. Good reaction to 'Have I dropped a

brick?' Miss Mockridge making it known that she had. The entrance of the men breaking that sensitivity with momentary light small talk. Again the lift to lighting as Robert entered d.l. and good reaction to 'Do you belong?' picked up by Miss M within her references to this little group being cosy and smug, showing her willingness to stir things a little and

pointing to her own separateness. The direction was careful and very well thought out. Not a situation calling for over plotting but here subtle movement which was much complimentary to the dialogue. Charles moving to the window seat - an example of one simple movement which changed a picture entirely and as quests departed and returned home groups so naturally contracted and expanded in very nice detail that was a joy to watch. Olwen's 'I remember that box' good group position for the talk that this remark stimulated. Olwen and Miss M listening very well and again a nice position for Freda on 'Olwen has been in love with you for ages'. Lovely control of dialogue in Freda, Olwen, Robert discussion so well balanced and their dawning realisation that Stanton had taken the money was most effective and gave a cliff hanger ending to Act 1.

As the plot embraced one character after another scenes were well shaped reaching their climaxes with good pointing. As Charles behaviour was revealed the argument among the men was excellent. Charles admitting the theft and then his narrative well done and well listened to. Robert and Freda talking about Tintagel and Olwen and Gordon sitting u.s. removed from action presented a telling picture. Gordon and Freda arguing and distressed, the subject again Martin. Robert showing his strength as he talks them down. Interesting group. Olwen facing u.s. and Gordon and Charles d.s. of her. Charles 'You've got it all wrong' and Olwen's 'martin didn't shoot

himself'. Further examples of timing. In Act 3 Olwen's telling of her story in lovely control and brought good differing reactions. Its quietness a marked contrast after so much high emotion. Her postscript brought very good reaction from Stanton and Betty. Olwen's 'It can't happen it shan't happen' The wedding march cross fades with the dance tune. The dancers take their partners and

the dangerous corner is avoided, but at cost.

Presentation:

Village Hall, no permanent stage. Platform stage built by E.B.D.G. Few facilities used to the best advantage. The set gave the impression of space and looked architecturally convincing. One or two pieces most appropriate furniture, good sofa and overmantle. I like the embroidered fire-screen. Good pictures. The wall lamps were used to good effect.

Sound. Nice choice of curtain music and other effects worked well.

Lighting. Good firelight effect whilst curtain up music played. Good initial lighting being enhanced with more as Freda and Robert made their respective entrances. An interesting lift on each occasion.

Wardrobe. The ladies costumes were very good, well chosen colours and styles. The men in dinner jackets all looking comfortable.

Properties. In keeping to period.

General Remarks:

What a lovely play this is and so well suited to this beautifully integrated company. The text is marvellous and you rose to its demands.

Despite all your staging difficulties you presented a set pleasing to look at and one that worked.

An enthusiastic audience and very good F.O.H.

Summary:

You must feel pleased with your work and achievement.
