# **ABOUT THE CAST...**

**MICHAEL CLARKE** is a long standing member of the group and has played many parts, from a cannibal to Nazi officer. He was last seen as an ageing lecher in *For Services Rendered*. We trust Michael's portrayal of Quartermaine depends more on his acting skills than on his day-job experiences. He's a teacher!

LIZ MORGAN last appeared with EBDG as a frustrated spinster in For Services Rendered, since when she has portrayed a pregnant wife in Straight and Narrow at Robin Hood Theatre, Averham. Never one to duck the dramatic challenges, Liz now tackles marriage, frustration and pregnancy all in one play.

**PETER SALTER** is currently Chairman of EBDG, and has made stage appearances with the Group for many years, including an Indian, a Welshman, a German and a suicidal maniac. More recently he has chosen less extravagant parts such as a drunkard in *Season's Greetings* and a blind war-hero in *For Services Rendered*.

**ALAN HAYDOCK** is well known to our audiences both on stage and as part of our Front of House team. Last year Alan triumphed as "Best Actor" in the NANDA Festival with his portrayal of the actor impersonating the Prime Minister in *Dead Ringer*. There has been some mild apprehension lest these skills were called for during the last few weeks!

**MICK QUINN** most recently in Season's Greetings was found cavorting under a Christmas Tree; previously he played the ultimate henpecked husband in *Rookery Nook*. Now as the accident-prone Meadle, we hope that Mick's invaluable set-building skills are not prejudiced by his getting too much "into character".

**GEOFF MORGAN** is not seen on the EBDG stage as often as his acting talents deserve. He directed For Services Rendered and has designed the sets for many of our plays, including this current production. Geoff was last seen as the devious Home Secretary in Dead Ringer. This time he has to learn how to play croquet - an equally devious occupation!

**JEAN STARBUCK** can definitely be described as one of our "stalwarts". Amazingly for an amateur group, EBDG had its customary difficulty in casting the (only two) female roles; so in spite of her stated preference for a "rest", Jean has been coerced into the role of Melanie, which she performs with her usual consummate skill.
