## Members' Spotlight

## Meet Marjory Soar





As a child of about four years old, I was taken to my first live theatre performance which took place in a village hall in County Durham. I think it must have been a show for Brownies, Cubs, Scouts and Girl Guides. I was transfixed seeing all the children on stage and immediately knew that this was something I wanted to do. I was so envious of a little girl playing the role of the painted doll in a scene called "The Wedding of the Painted Doll".

My father was a keen amateur actor and from the age of seven or eight I would help him to learn his lines. I was probably reading Noel Coward and Agatha Christie plays at this stage and I certainly knew the lines better than my father!

At school I would always volunteer to be involved in plays. There was never any auditioning, you were just told which part you could play. When I was sixteen, I played Bottom in "A Midsummer Night's Dream" and I thought I was living my own dream. When the time came to decide my path beyond school I was desperately keen to go to Drama School but my father, always a pragmatist, refused to let me go. I have to admit that in hindsight he was right. I would probably have spent much of my life working in a range of jobs whilst "resting"! Instead, I became a student at Teacher Training College in Lincoln and spent a great deal of my time performing in plays.

I moved to West Bridgford in 1970 to take up my first teaching post and joined West Bridgford Dramatic Society. On the first evening I attended there was an audition taking place and I was invited to read for a part. This was to change my life! At the same audition was a certain Geoff Soar. We were cast as a honeymoon couple and his first words to me were "As I'm going to be your husband, I'd better introduce myself". We married two years later and continued our involvement with the group until our children arrived on the scene and attending rehearsals became difficult.

In 2005, we moved to East Bridgford and knowing that there was an active drama group in the village, we lost no time in joining. During the last seventeen years we have been involved in many productions. The group has the reputation of being one of the best locally and we have been so fortunate to be a part of it. The fun and friendship we have enjoyed has been a huge part of our lives. Although I still love to be on stage, line learning is becoming increasingly challenging but just being involved in a production whether back stage, front of house or tea and coffee making is still enormous fun when you are with such a great group of people.
